DR MAHONRI OWEN



Since 2015 Dr. Mahonri Owen has maintained an active research program that looks at the relationship between people, the world and technology. Mahonri's research is inclusive of Mātauranga Māori and its influence in a world that is striving for sustainability. His current field of research is most easily defined as assistive technologies for rehabilitation. The field can be broadly defined as belonging to the larger fields of prosthetics, robotics, neurology and assistive technologies.

My rangahau aims to uncover the possibilities that Play-Based Learning might hold. To ignite curiosity and embrace the wisdom of our tupuna. My rangahau dives deep into the powerful connections between play and Te Ao Māori, blending Euro-Western concepts with Māori teachings. Creating vibrant learning environments that spark joy and fuels student engagement.

Te Whānau-a-Apanui, Whakatōhea, Ngāti Porou, Tūhoe, Ngāti Awa, Ngā Puhi Te Pua Wānanga ki te Ao | Faculty of Māori and Indigenous Studies

A Tiriti o Waitangi compliant approach towards a healthy Māori future: Evaluating the effectiveness of Tiriti o Waitangi/Treaty of Waitangi training programmes within public health care

Te Tiriti o Waitangi/The Treaty of Waitangi was developed in part as a response to concerns over Māori health and wellbeing and therefore obliges the Crown to reduce health disparities between Māori and non-Māori. However, persistent inequitable health outcomes suffered by Māori are indicators that the health system has been and continues to be non-Tiriti-compliant. My research investigates the efficacy of Te Tiriti o Waitangi training programmes as a means of achieving better outcomes in health for Māori.

DANIELLE SMITH - TOHU KAIRANGI | PHD

Ngāti Tūwharetoa Te Raupapa | Waikato Management School Sustainable Housing for Māori: Urban Papakāinga

There currently exists a housing crisis in Aotearoa disproportionately disadvantaging Māori in terms of health and wellbeing inequities. Therefore, my research investigates the facilitators and barriers of urban papakāinga, a form of Māori housing; thus, contributing to enhanced housing and health outcomes for Māori.







TUI MOANA MACDONALD - TOHU KAIRANGI | PHD

Te Atiawa, Ngāpuhi, Ngāti Ranginui, Ngāti Paoa Te Raupapa | Waikato Management School

Wāhine Māori entrepreneurs and business growth: Investigating the cultural, social, and economic enablers and challenges.

The Māori economy is currently worth \$70 billion and is steadily growing at 5 percent per annum. It is expected to reach \$100 billion in assets by 2030. Within this Māori economy, almost 40% of 23,000 Māori-owned businesses had wāhine Māori as owners (Te Puni Kōkiri, 2022). While there is increasing research into the Māori economy and Māori entrepreneurship, there is very little academic knowledge of wāhine Māori entrepreneurship and business growth.

This PhD research is a longitudinal and qualitative study examining the lived experiences of 10 wāhine Māori entrepreneurs who have experienced or are currently undergoing business growth.



MONA-LISA WAREKA - TOHU KAIRANGI | PHD

Ngātiwai, Rereahu Te Kura Aronui | School of Social Sciences

Restor(y)ing Taru Rauhea: Understanding the Relationship of Māori and Cannabis in Aotearoa

This doctoral research engages with Māori who use, work with, have a relationship with, grow, sell, and/or rely on cannabis for a variety of reasons. It aims to analyse the developed significance of cannabis to Māori, as a means of putting kai on the table, to relieve pain, and as a way of connecting back to Papatūānuku. This research attempts to platform Māori voices and create a transformative narrative of the Māori-cannabis relationship with the hopes of influencing cannabis law reform in the future.

Kāi Tahu

Te Kura Aronui | School of Social Sciences

Reconnection with DNA: Policy and issues with direct-to-consumer DNA testing for Māori identity and whakapapa.

Colonial policies of assimilation and integration have had devastating effects on Māori. For some, it is a complete loss of identity and connection to whakapapa. DNA technology has opened a window of opportunity for reconnection. My research examines the policies and issues in the context of Māori identity and whakapapa.

Ngā Puhi, Ngāti Porou Te Pua Wānanga ki te Ao | Faculty of Māori and Indigenous Studies

Te Mōhiotangaora harakeke raranga/whatu | From your hands to my hands to their hands

Can the practice of raranga whatu affirm wahine Māori identity is the central inquiry within this academic composition? This Creative Arts thesis boldly recounts the journey of a Māori woman attending Waikato University in search of her wahine Māori identity. Through an exegesis platform, this research interweaves two distinct forms of knowledge: a creative harakeke taonga and critical text analysis; through creative writing and self-reflection, it examines the role of cultural practices in shaping individual and collective identities.
